2024 School Climate Survey

Earlier this year our district gathered feedback from all our constituents as part of the 2024 School Climate Survey. This was a follow-up to the original 2022 survey. We have taken the past few months to fully analyze the results in isolation and compared to the previous survey administration. Thank you to all who participated. We hope you will take the time to review the Executive Summary and more comprehensive reports available on the



website (simply scan or click on the QR code). The results from this survey are very positive and consistent with the previous survey. We also added a few questions related to the district's Strategic Plan. Please consider taking some time this summer to review the results and we will continue to incorporate them as we look to next school year and beyond.

2021 Facilities Bond Project



The Board of Education recently approved an updated Design and Construction Schedule for the 2021 Facilities Bond. We are nearing the midway point of the approved projects and have experienced a significant level of escalation on supply and labor costs in the first two years of this bond program. The district has recently conducted a full review of current bond funds and projected available funds for the future projects in Groups 3

and 4. This review and the updated timeline forecasts funding for the remainder of the bond program. Additionally, the board approved a list of "Deferred Projects" that have been placed on hold until there are available funds. Group 2 projects are all under construction this summer and we have started the design phase on Group 3. RCS Band Program Highlights

We had another exciting year for our Romeo Bands. During the course of the year, our students at the middle and high school levels had the opportunity to perform at many different venues and events. During the second semester, students performed at school concerts, competed at band festivals, and performed at solo and ensemble events. As always, our Bulldog Bands brought their absolute best and did an outstanding job representing our district.

In January we had nearly 130 events that performed at the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association (MSBOA) **District XVI Solo and Ensemble Festival**. Nearly all of these performances earned first and second-division ratings, which are the highest possible ratings. The students prepared solos and small groups and performed for an expert adjudicator on their instrument. In addition, many of our high school events qualified for **State Solo and Ensemble** and represented our school at Port Huron Northern High School in March. During that festival, our **RHS Woodwind Choir** was selected as an "Outstanding Ensemble" for the State of Michigan.



Our full bands also performed well in the MSBOA Band Festival in March. We had five bands perform at Dakota and Anchor Bay High Schools and all of them did outstanding work. All

three high school bands earned a Superior (highest) rating and our middle school bands earned a Superior and Excellent rating. Each group performed three pieces of music and sight-read music for an expert panel of judges.

We finished up our year with several performances. This year, we were able to bring back our Romeo Bands Collage Concert featuring all of our bands from 6th to 12th grade. We also were able to create our inaugural class of the Tri-M Music Honors Society. These outstanding students will be working within our community for service, charity, and excellence in music.





We closed out the year by honoring our community members who have served in the armed forces in the Romeo Memorial Day Parade. This performance featured members of our 8th grade in addition to the RHS marching band. We look forward to another great year in 2024-25!



For the second consecutive year, Romeo Community Schools achieved the designation of Best Community for Music Education by the NAMM (National Association of Music Merchants) Foundation. The recognition considered various factors, such as course

offerings, competition scores, enrollment, and school and community support. We are thrilled to receive this well-deserved honor in recognition of excellent music programs across the district.

ROMEO MIDDLE SCHOOL BAND AND CHOIR

RMS Music Excels

The Romeo Middle School Bands and Choir continue to excel. Along with school performances throughout the year, both groups went to the Michigan Band and Choir Festivals. Throughout the school year there were 164 students that participated in choir, three choir concerts totaling 40 pieces of music, and a first ever showing at both the Michigan School Vocal Music Association (MSVMA) Solo and Ensemble and Choir Festival. Eighth grader **Hudson Rice** participated in Solo and Ensemble at Chippewa Valley High School and received a Division 1 Superior rating.

The 7th and 8th grade choir participated in the MSVMA Choir Festival at Stoney Creek High School and received a Division 1 Superior rating, with an almost perfect score in the sight reading category.

At the Michigan School Band & Orchestra Association (MSBOA) festival, the 8th Grade Symphony Band received a Division I (Superior) rating with straight 1st ratings from all the judges. The 7th/8th Grade Concert Band received a Division II (Excellent) rating. The band also performed at school events such as the OSCAR ceremony and Student of the Trimester celebrations.

Our Romeo Middle School bands have been busy visiting the elementary schools to show our younger students all of the various instruments that



they can learn to play. We also had **Owen Kuchenmeister**, **Ivana Misajlovich**, **Kathleen Gray**, **Aidan Phillips**, and **Kayla Kranson** represent our school in the **MSBOA District XVI Honors Band**. The students were part of an all-star group from Macomb, Oakland, and St. Clair Counties who performed a concert at Lakeview High School in April. Our 8th grade Symphony Band also provided the music for the annual OSCAR ceremony at RMS and performed in the orchestra pit.







Romeo Theatre Company

Romeo Theatre had an amazing season with three full productions, scholarships awarded at Michigan Thespian Festival, and two students chosen to perform at MSU Wharton Theatre for the Sutton Foster Standing Ovation Awards.

It was Kendra Knoblock's final bow as director of RTC after 35 years and over 100 productions. The final season opened with the classic drama **12 Angry Jurors**. The skill and maturity was evident as many commented that after the first few moments one forgot these actors were high school students. The crowd was hushed as audience members waited for the final verdict.

The second production, chosen by the Theatre I students, brought back the popular *You're a Good Man Charlie Brown*. The musical captures

classic moments of the Peanuts gang with the stage transforming into a comic strip, right down to outlining the costumes.

The final production was the musical *Shrek*, a show Mrs. Knoblock wanted to create for years, but needed the right group to make it possible. She says her only regret was not having a second weekend available, as the show sold out days before the performances. The costumes, make-up, and technical design looked professional, but were still created by students. The 20-foot dragon and costumes have already been sold to another school! Congratulations to Kayla Sak (Fiona) and Sawyer Lackowski (Farquuad) for being chosen as the Sutton Foster Recipients. We would also like to congratulate Chloe Allen and Kayla Sak for the scholarships they received at the Michigan Thespian Festival to further their studies in musical theater.

On December 15-16, the RMS Theater program presented *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever*. The over 80 member cast and crew worked hard to put on amazing performances for their families and the Romeo community. On April 26 and 27, the RMS theater students returned to the stage with their performance of *The Wizard of Oz Youth Edition*. An ensemble group also previewed the show for the Board of Education. The students involved worked hard learning music, choreography, and blocking, along with keeping up with their school work, and were able to perform for over 950 people between the two performance dates. In both productions, students not only acted on stage, but also ran lights, sound and served as the backstage crew. RMS Theater also hosted an after





school drama club where over 75 students gathered once a week to work on theater skills to prepare them for the play and the musical and to enhance their skills in theater. The students in both productions and Drama Club were led by RMS Theater Teachers Patrick Salembier and Chelsea McKay.







Athletics Recap

Our sports teams ended the 2023-24 school year with some notable accomplishments. These include four MAC Division Championships – the Boys Soccer team, Girls Cross Country team, Boys Bowling team and Girls Bowling team. Both the Volleyball and Wrestling teams won District Championships. The Hockey team and the Boys and Girls Cross Country teams also brought home Regional Championships! Our Dance team finished in fourth place in Pom and eighth place in Jazz at Nationals and 11 sports were represented in the State finals.

Career Day at Romeo High School, the Michigan Career Quest Southwest, a visit to Macomb Community College, online career card sorting to help determine a pathway for 10th to 12th graders, a tour of all the pathways at RHS, the Pathway Reveal Ceremony, and college tours based on which Academy they elected to attend (Northwood University for the Academy of Business, Entrepreneurship and Innovation; Kettering for the Academy of Design, Engineering and Manufacturing, and Detroit Mercy for the Academy of Health, Human and Public Service).

At the end of May, 9GA students and staff celebrated a successful year with the Academy Awards, which recognized achievement in core classes as well as outstanding character traits. The afternoon concluded in the stadium for the announcement of which team — Discovery, Expedition or Quest — received the most points based on overall academic performance and participation. The winner of the coveted Bulldog Trophy, with a grand total of 21,772 points, was Team Expedition.

Freshman Seminar Interviews

Seminar was a time built in the 9th graders' schedule when they learned a lot of skills they will bring with them next year when they transition from the 9th Grade Academy to Romeo High School. From getting to know one another in the opening module, to

improving their communication skills – tuning in to others, using active listening, connecting with peers, and giving and receiving feedback, to name a few – and learning how to resolve conflicts were all valuable lessons they explored.

The culminating activity was a presentation to peers in Seminar class. To practice for this, the 9th graders participated in mock interviews with adults, including business partners and Romeo staff. Questions included which Portrait of a Romeo Graduate value they demonstrate most regularly (and ways upholding that value has been challenging) along with two "pros" and one "grow" as they looked back on their freshman year.

Interviewers were asked to complete a rubric to provide helpful feedback to the students in helping them prepare the "Four P's" to a successful presentation: purpose, plan, poise and practice. For example, pointers for "poise" include maintaining eye contact and positive facial expressions, having good posture, and speaking clearly and confidently.

THE BEI ACADEMY

A Cross-Curricular Celebration of Food

In its second year, the food truck project has expanded to include students in the Academy of Business, Entrepreneurship and Innovation (BEI) as well as pathways in other academies. The project was spearheaded by BEI teacher Shelly Bartolotta, who guided students along the way in her business classes while working with Chef Jerry from the culinary classes. The theme this year was state-inspired cuisine, with 20 states represented. The culminating event was a Staff Appreciation lunch on May 7, in which teachers and staff at Romeo High School enjoyed visiting the food trucks and sampling food prepared by culinary students while learning about the culture of the various locales, from Michigan to Hawaii.

History students researched and wrote about the state's history with food for each truck, science students tested and made hand sanitizers for the crowd, math students calculated the space configuration and made maps for the courtyard, and English students wrote about the state's history. In addition, construction students helped build the trucks.

Participating in the morning session in January were local entrepreneurs or professionals who work in the entrepreneurial environment. These business people were assigned to individual table groups, serving as coaches to guide the students through each section of a business canvas exercise while using their own personal business experience and real-world insight to help them form a solid solution.

The goal of the event, according to April Boyle, Velocity's Senior Advisor for Entrepreneurship and Innovation, was to introduce entrepreneurship as a realistic option to the students while they are still young.

"We know that with the right support, information, resources and education, it is a very viable option as a career path and we want to give the students the tools and resources that are necessary to try it," she said.

THE DEM ACADEMY

The Future of the Ford Engine Plant



Students in the architecture pathway in the Academy of Design, Engineering and Manufacturing (DEM) came up with their own vision for the future of the Romeo Ford Engine Plant property. On May 29, they shared their innovative ideas with the public at

Romeo Graubner Library during an open house. Their designs were also on display in storefronts throughout the community through June 6.

Natalie Lawrence had the idea of a Romeo performing arts center featuring two big professional performance halls, an additional covered venue, an open air theater and a welcome center. Braylon Welch created Romeo Raceway as a nod to Ford's history with racing "and since Detroit is the Motor City, it is fitting to have a racetrack located in Romeo."

Zandr Kryscynski pictured above, designed the Romeo Village Mall to create more employment and support recreational fun for the communities of Romeo, Washington, Bruce Township and other neighboring counties.

"The Romeo Ford Engine Plant created a lot of jobs," he said. "It created a community – people who worked in that area of expertise – so I thought we should replace it with another place that can create community."

From architecture teacher Evva Dossin's perspective, the project was exceptionally worthwhile.

"They got to experience a real-world application," she said. "They gained practical experience in applying theoretical knowledge to real-world engineering challenges. They also learned to work with many different types of professionals within the field, learn common design software, and explore new upcoming technology used in the industry."

MITES Awards

Among the 81 projects from architecture, machine tool, mechanical design, drafting and construction classes entered into the Michigan Industrial Technology



Education Society (MITES) 2024 regional competition, 49 advanced to the state competition. Three projects won the **Regional Grand Award** for best in their combined division of Architectural Design, Wrought Metal and Electrical.

At the state level, 33 projects ranked in the top 10 with four first places, five second places and three third places. Romeo High School also won the **Grand Award** for Electrical Best in the State and Architectural Division B award.

The top award winners were senior **Vincent Guareimo** for his electrical project and senior **Brianna Komaromi** for her drafting interior design project.

Junior **David Atkinson**, pictured above, won the Grand Award at regionals and second place at states for his wing sculpture. The sculpture is designed for people to take selfies, then post the selfie with a hashtag "to draw attention to the school and everything that is going on at the DEM Academy," David explained. The sculpture is made out of aluminum, with the individual feathers either sandblasted or polished.

David, a member of the National Honor Society and National Technical Honor Society, hopes to study mechanical engineering in college.

Introduction to Education Projects



Robo Bulldogs Tackle Worlds

When the Indian Hills Robo Bulldogs began building their robot in August for this year's FIRST Robotics LEGO League Challenge season, they never dreamed that their work would take them to Long Beach, Calif., to compete with FIRST Robotics teams from all over the world.

This team of 4th and 5th graders Jonathan Aymen, William Cherfoli, Julian Francis, Ben Miller, and Jonah Peter worked for three months to build and program a robot to complete various challenges and designed their own real-world Innovation Project, which emphasized efforts to "Save the Penguins" from habitat loss and the harmful effects of pollution.

After taking home Champions trophies from their Regional Tournament and the State Tournament, they were one of only eight elementary teams from Michigan to be invited to the World Invitational Tournament in California. Thanks to the generosity of the high school FIRST Robotics team, the Byting Bulldogs, who paid their \$1,800 registration fee, the sponsorship of Anderson, Eckstein & Westrick, Inc., Ares Technology, L&L Products, and the support of parents and the Indian Hills community, the team was able to participate in three days of "Coopertition," a core value of the FIRST Robotics program that emphasizes a collaborative approach to friendly competition.

Prepared for the challenge from their experiences at the regional and state levels, the boys faced teams from all over the world with players as old as 16. In the "On the Spot" competition, they worked in an alliance with teams from Pittsburgh and Brazil to program a robot in a variety of missions overnight.

While the Robo Bulldogs didn't place in the top three in any of the three categories, they declared the experience an overall success. It allowed them to build their coding and presentation skills, bond as a team, and spread their message about saving the penguins.

"They worked so hard all year round," said Julia Cherfoli, who coached the team along with parent Rachel Miller. "They met multiple times a week. They did weekend activities and projects. I'm really proud of all the effort they put forward."
