Letter from the Superintendent

Dear RCS Community,

As you read this, anticipation is building for the end of the school year. Our staff and students have accomplished so much since our last newsletter in February that we felt it was important to send an electronic version of *The Bulldog Bulletin* this spring to our district families and staff. We still plan to publish our annual "Year in Review" newsletter that will be mailed to all residents later this summer.

Spring is such a fast-paced time of year full of celebrations, special events and milestones. We are

so proud of our students and the progress they have made this year. While this newsletter can't possibly capture it all, it does share some highlights from this past semester.

We have been diligently planning for next year over the past several months and in the next two months the Board of Education will approve the 2024-25 preliminary budget. Additionally, the board will be asked to take action on updating the design and construction schedule for the 2021 Facilities Bond that is approaching its halfway point in completion. Unfortunately, due to consistent escalation in materials and labor costs, we will not be able to finish all of the projects outlined in the Department of Treasury approved bond application from July of 2021. A list of "Deferred Projects" will be approved along with the updated timeline at the May Board of Education meeting. We will share this important information on our website once it is finalized.

We have received several inquiries about the school calendar for next year. The calendar is part of the negotiations process with the Romeo Education Association. Negotiations on a new contract are ongoing and we will share this important information as soon as it is available.

Please take a minute to review the great news contained in this e-newsletter and enjoy the remainder of this school year. Additionally, allow me to be the first to wish you a safe and relaxing summer break.

9GA Pathway Reveal Ceremony

The envelope, please ...

On March 8, 9th graders gathered in the Romeo High School auditorium for the long-awaited pathway reveal ceremony, in which they were given envelopes containing their pathway for the remaining years of their high school experience.



At the opening of the ceremony, 9GA Principal Melissa Arendts reminded them of the steps they had taken along their journey of selecting that pathway. These included participating in Career Day at Romeo High School, attending the Southeast Michigan Career Quest at the Suburban Collection Showcase in Novi, visiting Macomb Community College, and touring the pathways at RHS before reviewing their top choices with their parents.

After opening the envelope, each 9th grader discovered whether they will be joining the Academy of Business, Entrepreneurship and Innovation (BEI), the Academy of Design, Engineering and Manufacturing (DEM), or the Academy of Health, Human and Public Service (HHP).

Speakers during the ceremony included Superintendent Dr. Todd Robinson and Macomb County Executive Mark Hackel.

"Romeo has been a role model and you are so lucky to be a part of this pathway program you have here," said Hackel.

Said Dr. Robinson: "If I was to think about who you were when you left the eighth grade and I think about what you've become today, there might not be a single greater period of growth in terms of maturity and independence in K-12 education outside of that."

RCS Teacher of the Year: John Phillips




John Phillips, a 1999 Romeo High School graduate, returned to the district 10 years ago as a teacher to help rebuild the band program.

Language Classes Open a World of Culture

What does dancing have to do with teaching world languages? More than one might expect.

Three world language teachers at Romeo High School dedicated class time to having their students learn different styles of dance – salsa, bachata, merengue and Latin ballroom dancing for Spanish classes, and the Viennese waltz for German classes.

Professional ballroom instructor Sherrad Glosson led the dance workshops for students from Andrea Page's German classes and Rosana Hunsberger and Hayley Kelso's Spanish classes. Mrs. Kelso's international business students also joined in the fun.

All three teachers agree that dance is culturally important. For example, festivals, holidays, family parties and music revolve around dance.

"When I studied abroad, that was one of the first things we did," Señora Hunsberger said. "At the welcome ceremony at the hotel, literally three hours into my study, I was taking a dance lesson."

Frau Page's German students were introduced to the waltz during a school trip to Germany some years ago.

Inviting Mr. Glosson – who also happens to be Señora Kelso's dance instructor – offered a way to celebrate different cultures while allowing the students to relax and have fun outside the classroom.

"The kids love it," Señora Kelso said. "I love watching them enjoying each other's company, completely unself-conscious, team building. They're learning a valuable skill but in a fun way. They're so supportive of each other. Nobody is critiquing; there's no judgment."



A Celebration of Food Across the States

Students in the Business, Entrepreneurship and Innovation (BEI) Academy at Romeo High School joined forces across pathways to bring back the popular food truck project—just in time for Staff Appreciation Week! To create 20 trucks representing popular food from 20 states, business management students pitched food truck ideas to the marketing department at Lombardo Homes, who helped with the concepts and delivery. Culinary students tested the recipes and made the food, marketing students designed T-shirts representing each truck for students to wear, history students researched and wrote about the state's history with food for each truck, science students tested and made hand sanitizers for the crowd, math students calculated the space configuration and made maps for the courtyard (and indoors in the event of rain), and English students wrote about the state's history. In addition, construction students from the DEM Academy helped build the trucks and journalism students wrote an article showcasing the event.

RMS Teacher Named Macomb County Middle School Teacher of the Year

Romeo Middle School Language Acquisition teacher Amanda Mazzio was chosen as Macomb County's 2024 Outstanding Teacher of the Year at the Middle School level. Mrs. Mazzio was surprised with this news at a morning assembly on March 21, hours before she received a notification letter from the Macomb Intermediate School District via email. According to math support and reading intervention teachers Lyndsy Bickmann and Michelle Schommer, who nominated their colleague for the district's Outstanding Teacher of the Year award, "Amanda Mazzio consistently goes above and beyond for her colleagues and for her students. She is already masterful in her role as the RMS Multilingual Learner Interventionist and leader of the 31a team, yet she is always reflective in her practice and seeks out information and strategies to continuously improve."

Mrs. Mazzio's personal philosophy of education is that teachers are gardeners and their role is to "discover what each of our students need to grow and provide conditions in which they can thrive. . . . Each

student is unique and deserves to be seen as such. In order to care for the whole child, we must understand their background, interests, learning styles, wealth of experiences, prior knowledge and more so that we can give each student what they need to flourish."

This is especially true with her multilingual students in the English Learners program as well as the "newcomers," the English language acquisition students who are new to this country and learning English for the first time.

"I have never had the personal experience, other than studying abroad, of living in a new place with a new language and trying to figure everything out all at the same time," Mrs. Mazzio said. "To be able to offer any amount of help and support to students who are doing something that is really quite incredible is very meaningful to me. Mrs. Mazzio also prides herself on striving for equity in her classroom and advocating within the school and district to ensure all students have access to food, internet, school supplies and anything else they need to be successful.

In addition to receiving a \$1,500 Professional Development voucher, Mrs. Mazzio was recognized on April 11 at the Outstanding Teacher of the Year Awards Banquet, held at the Italian American Cultural Society and Banquet Center in Clinton Township.

"Amanda's positive impact on students goes way beyond her classroom to the school and the community," said RMS Principal Brad Martz. "I could not be more proud of Amanda's accomplishments. She is very deserving of this award."

Fifth Graders Visit RMS

Every morning for a week, Romeo Middle School hosted fifth graders from each elementary school for a comprehensive preview of what to expect next year. Instrumental in planning for the visits, leading an icebreaker activity, serving as tour guides and answering questions were eighth graders from the RMS leadership class pictured below. Dog Dens Create Sense of Belonging at Indian Hills



Dog Dens, on hiatus during the pandemic, have returned this year to Indian Hills Elementary School.

Dog Dens are small groups of kindergarten through fifth grade students led by a staff member. In fact, every adult on staff — with the exception of the administrative assistant, who mans the front desk during the meetings — is assigned to one of these small groups.

"It's been really exciting because the whole purpose of Dog Dens is to build this sense of community across the school," said Indian Hills Principal Lisa Wujczyk. "Kids who wouldn't normally connect with one another and kids who wouldn't normally connect with particular adults get that opportunity to make those connections."



The group remains together throughout the year – and across the years. For example, next year students will remain in the same den, with the exception of the fifth graders who will move on to middle school. New kindergarteners will join in, along with any other new students.

"It helps to build that greater sense of community across the school so that when kids see each other in the hallways, they say, "I know you from Dog Dens,'" Mrs. Wujczyk explained.

This is the case when they see teachers as well, increasing their sense of comfort wherever they are in the school building.

Amanda Moore Recognized as Evergreen School

Amanda Moore Elementary School was recognized at the Tri-County Green Schools celebration event at the Detroit Zoo on April 23 for its Evergreen status.

Amanda Moore was first named a Green School in 2012, and has maintained this status thanks to the efforts of the Green Team, parent volunteers and Principal Roger Bennett.

This year's team has 50 students in grades 3 through 5 and is led by Green Team cosponsors and parents Joanna Serra and Stephen Anderson.

To become a Green School is a rigorous process, involving completing an application documenting activities in the four categories of Reduce/Reuse/Recycle, Energy, Environmental Protection, and Miscellaneous Environmental Activities. Evergreen status is the highest among designations and requires documentation of 20 total activities within these categories.

In 2018-2019, Amanda Moore was named the top Evergreen School in Macomb County. Projects it completed over the years include holding a community drive for bottle caps and creating the world's first endangered species bottle cap interactive wall mural, and building a greenhouse that is still in use today by the Green Team.

RCS Teacher of the Year: Krista Miller

Drama teacher Kendra Knoblock promised to "go big or go home" for her final production for Romeo Theatre Company before she retires this spring. She chose *Shrek the Musical*, a large-scale, ambitious show that she knew her performers and behind-the-scenes helpers were up to the challenge.

Romeo Theatre Company has been in existence for 35 years. The extracurricular program is the largest in the school, with nearly 200 students involved both on stage and backstage, from costumes, lighting and set design to choreography.

"The students run it all, which is really exciting," Mrs. Knoblock said. "I think that's the best thing about our program. We're not a parent run organization; we're a student run organization."

She added that the experience of participating in RHS's productions equips students with the skills future employers are seeking.

"We've gone to several workrelated sites and the first thing employers say is, 'We want people to think out of the box," she said. "We want people who can work



as a team. We want people who can be hands on. We want people who can be adaptable.

"These kids have to work together," she continued. "They work as a team. They are creating with as little a budget as possible and making things look absolutely amazing. These are skills the kids are going to go out and use in whatever field they're going into. All of the skills learned in the arts are something they can use."

On the mat, the **Cheer** team was electric all season. They used that momentum to finish in second place at Districts and competed well enough to finish in the top half at Regionals.


